

## Did President Step In With Assist For Cupid?

# Delay Deportation Action Against Greek Seamen

CHICAGO, Ill. — Did President Eisenhower take time out from the business of state to help a distraught Davenport girl save her Greek seaman fiancé from deportation?

Unusual last-minute events in the case here Friday afternoon indicated someone in a high position might be interested in the love story that has aroused the sympathy of the nation.

Deportation proceedings for the five Greek seamen, including Demosthenes Scaramangos, fiancé of Angeline Bogiatzopoulos, 2641 Sheridan St., were unexpectedly postponed for an indefinite period Friday afternoon.

**The postponement came on-**

**ly minutes before Scaramangos was to appear for a deportation hearing. Immigration officers indicated interest in the case by high government officials might have been responsible for the delay.**

Three of the seamen were released Friday after posting \$1,000 bond each. They are Alexandros Scaramangos, 50, father of Demosthenes, Stelios Caifass 38, and Ioannis Koninas, 23.

### DAD WON'T POST BOND

The elder Scaramangos and Caifass are expected to return to Davenport today, while Koninas will go to Pittsburgh, Pa.

Although he had enough money to post bond for his son, the elder Scaramangos refused, saying he had to send the mon-

ey to the rest of his family still in Greece. He said the family of his son's fiancé should post the bond.
