Love Story of Greek Seaman, Davenport Girl Hits New Note; He Marries Another

The love story of a young Greek seaman and his former Davenport fiancée took a new but decisive twist last night.

The seaman, Dennis Scaramangos, 22, married Rosalie Woodworth, 17-year-old daughter and one of 10 children of Mr. and Mrs. Jesse Woodworth, Campbell's Island, in the East Moline First Methodist Church, the Rev. Joseph Partridge, pastor, officiating.

For some time Scaramangos had been linked romantically with Angelina Bogiazopoulos of Davenport, who had fought impending deportation proceedings against Dennis every step of the way, even to the extent of a direct appeal to President Eisenhower.

Dennis and Rosalie were issued a marriage license by the Rock Island County clerk's office Sept. 1.

To Go to Pittsburgh

Rosalie told The Dispatch this morning that her husband, who had been rooming at 1227 6th Ave., Moline, went to Chicago today for a conference with immigration officials. She said he would finish his present job at a Davenport plant Friday and that then she and her husband plan to leave for Pittsburgh, where he has a new job waiting for him.

Rosalie said Dennis took their marriage license with him in hopes that the fact that he is married and that he has a job awaiting him in Pittsburgh might forestall deportation proceedings against him.

Until they leave for Pittsburgh, Dennis and Rosalie will reside with her parents.

Claim Illegal Entry

Scaramangos and four other Greek seamen, including his father, were picked up in Betendorf several weeks ago by immigration officials and charged with entering this country illegally. They were alleged to have jumped ship about two years ago and had been in the Quad-Cities working at various jobs about six months.

Touched by the impending breakup of the sailor's romance with Miss Bogiazopoulos, citizens deluged Rep. Fred Schwengel (R-Ia.) and other officials with letters and telegrams. The girl wired President Eisenhower asking him to intercede. The result was a presidential order of further study of the case.

Finally, the girl went to Chicago to fight in the sailor's behalf. Immigration officials released Scaramangos on bond and gave him a period of time to show cause why he should not be deported. He returned to the Quad-Cities, but finally he was ordered to leave the country within a specified time.

Miss Bogiazopoulos said she didn't see him after that, and she soon began to hear rumors that he was going to marry another girl. But she said she didn't believe them.
